

PROGRAM ANNOUNCEMENT

Simplifying the Search Warrant Application

March 20 - 21, 2012

8:30 AM to 4:30 PM

The Public Safety Training Center in partnership with the U.S. Department of Justice, U.S. Attorney's Office will be conducting a criminal investigation course titled: Simplifying the Search Warrant Application. This course is designed to develop the student's abilities to better understand and create search warrants. The course has been developed and will be instructed by retired Rochester Police Department Investigator Scott Deming. This course will provide hands-on practical training for the proper completion of the search warrant process. Students will learn how to develop probable cause and to use that probable cause for the development of legally sufficient search warrants. This 16 hour course will be held at the above dates and time at the Training Center, Room 202, 1190 Scottsville Road, Rochester, New York. Class size is limited to 21 students.

Topics will include:

- Understanding the search warrant documents
- Development of probable cause
- Development of personal background to support probable cause
- Writing a search warrant
- Jurisdictional issues with regards to search warrants
- Secondary elements of the search warrant
- Process of getting the search warrant reviewed and signed
- Amending the search warrant
- Returning the search warrant
- Sealing of depositions and/or the affidavit in support of the search warrant

Students attending this course are expected to arrive with copies of the New York State Penal Law and the New York State Criminal Procedure Law that will be used to complete court documents and orders. It is recommended that students bring documentation of law enforcement training schools and seminars attended. This documentation will be used to develop and substantiate the student's law enforcement expertise.

Instructor Profile:

Mr. Scott Deming is currently employed by the United States Department of Justice, United States Attorney's Office as an OCDETF Financial Analyst/Investigator assigned to the Western District of New York. Mr. Deming previously worked as an instructor in the Law and Criminal Justice program at Genesee Community College. Mr. Deming retired from the Rochester Police Department in December 2005 after working in the law enforcement field serving the Monroe County Sheriff's Office and the Rochester Police Department for twenty-two years. He has been assigned to the Patrol Division as both a police officer and investigator. Mr. Deming was promoted to the position of investigator in 1991 a position he held until his

retirement. As an investigator with the Rochester Police Department he was assigned to the Field Investigation Section, the Homicide Investigation Section and The Special Investigation Section's Criminal Intelligence Unit and Violent Crime Task Force. Mr. Deming spent the majority of his years as an investigator in the Special Investigation Section conducting both follow-up and proactive criminal investigations that resulted in a wide range of investigative experience.

Mr. Deming holds an Associate's degree in Applied Science in Criminal Justice – Police Science from Monroe Community College, as well as a Bachelors of Arts Degree in Sociology from the State University of New York at Geneseo and a Masters in Public Administration Degree from the State University of New York at Brockport. He is certified by the Bureau for Municipal Police as a Police Officer General Topics Instructor and formerly as a Firearms Instructor. In addition, he is a state instructor for the New York State Department of Criminal Justice Services instructing investigative courses throughout New York State, including the state Police Supervisor's School and Investigator School. Mr. Deming has also taught as an adjunct faculty member at Monroe Community College Criminal Justice and Public Safety Training Center, as an adjunct faculty member at Monroe Community College in the Law and Criminal Justice Department, as an adjunct faculty member at Rochester Institute of Technology's Criminal Justice Department and continues to teach as an adjunct faculty member at Keuka College Criminal Justice Department and Genesee Community College in the Criminal Justice Program.

Successful completion of this course will be worth 1 college credit from Monroe Community College.

Tuition for this course is \$128.00 per person plus \$54.50 in student fees. *A certificate of residency from out-of-Monroe county residents is required in order to avoid double tuition billing.* You will be billed at the completion of the course. It will not be necessary to send a check or voucher prior to class.
